- Demonstrate ability to communicate recognized resiliencies and strengths of clients in treatment planning and counseling.
- Associated KPI and CACREP standard: Counseling and Helping Relationships, 2.F.5.f, Students will
 demonstrate an understanding of counselor characteristics and behaviors that influence the counseling process
- Evaluation plan:
 - o Individual data: CPCE, and CCS-R faculty scores in Summer 1 and again in Spring 2 of the program
 - Program Aggregate data: CPCE non-exit exam mean scores and CCS-R group mean scores
- Highlight the interactive dynamics in a household and among extended family and society as individual's developmental needs align or conflict with each other
- Associated KPI and CACREP standard: Human Growth and Development, 2.F.3.f, Students will demonstrate an understanding of systemic and environmental factors that affect human development, functioning, and behavior
- Evaluation plan:
 - Individual data: MHC 501, Human Growth and Development Critical Incident Paper Rubric and CPCE scores
 - Program Aggregate data: Critical Incident Paper Rubric mean scores and CPCE non-exit exam mean scores

In addition to the evaluation plan outlined above for each program objective, the following data is also used in program evaluation: student and employer post-graduation surveys, site supervisor evaluations of students, and faculty rated Counselor Competencies Scale-Revised (Lambie, Mullen, Swank, & Blount, 2016). The CCS-R assesses counselors' and trainees' skills development and professional competencies. Additionally, the CCS-R provides counselors and trainees with direct feedback regarding their demonstrated ability to apply counseling skills and facilitate therapeutic conditions, and their counseling dispositions (dominant qualities) and behaviors, offering the counselors and trainees practical areas for improvement to support their development as effective and ethical professional counselors.
